YEAR 2 CLASS: PUMAS



Puma class have thoroughly enjoyed completing our class book, 'The Princess and The White Bear King,' and have written an excellent letter of complaint as the Troll Queen. I certainly would not want to cross any pupil from the class!

In Science, on our topic on Habitats, we took part in an exciting experiment to test whether a layer of blubber on sea animals in the Arctic is to insulate them from the cold. The children dunked one hand that was wearing a glove made from lard and, very bravely, their bare hand into a bowl of iced water. There were some very brave children and some very cold hands afterwards, but the children all concluded that the lard created an extra layer of insulation. For the rest of the afternoon sessions this week we have been answering the big question, 'How should we care for the others and the world, and why does it matter?' We have delved into role play, listened to songs and Bible stories and learnt about Judaism. The children have continued to impress me with their empathy and appreciation of the world around us, and I'm sure that this kindness will continue through half term. We hope that you all have a wonderful break.

This week we were lucky enough to team up with the Jungle Cats who spent a lesson sharing their multiplication skills with us.
