# E-Safety Update – Ofcom Report 2024

In this week's issue of Headcorn headlines we would like to draw your attention to the summary of *Ofcom's 2024 findings on children and young adults' media habits and attitudes 2024*. (We have also included a guide for parents and carers for you to view from National Online Safety.)

# The findings...

# Gaming Online

- More children are gaming online compared to last year - 60% of 3–17-year-olds, up from 57% in 2022.

- Increases seen across age groups, including younger children aged 3-4 (23% vs 18% in 2022) and 5-7 (41% vs 34%).

- Boys are more likely than girls to game online (71% vs 58%).
- 89% of 11–18-year-olds game at least weekly.

# Popular Game Types

- Creative/building games like Minecraft are the most popular overall (45% of 3–17-year-old gamers).

- Older teens prefer multi-player games like Fortnite (48% of 16–17-year-olds) and shooter games like Call of Duty (41%).

- There is a worrying increase in 5–7-year-olds playing shooter games (15% vs 10% in 2022).
- Gender differences boys prefer sports games, girls prefer puzzles/quizzes.

# Who They Game With

- More children only play alone against the computer (67% vs 64% in 2022).
- Fewer playing with people they know in person (70% vs 73%) or strangers (29% vs 32%).
- From age 8+, more likely to play against known people (74%) and strangers (32%).
- 30% of 8–11-year-old online gamers play with strangers, similar to 16–17-year-olds (36%).
- 76% of 8–17-year-old online gamers chat through games, increasing with age.

As parents, we all want to ensure our children have positive experiences online. The findings show just how immersed children are in the gaming world these days.

While gaming can be an amazing outlet for creativity, socialization, and skill-building, it's also important we provide some guidance along the way. Why not take this opportunity to start an open conversation with your child about their gaming interests and favourites? Getting a window into their virtual adventures allows you to ensure the games and interactions are age-appropriate and enriching. Together, you can explore parental controls, etiquette for online play, and balanced tech habits.

The digital world opens so many possibilities for children. By staying curiously engaged as parents, we can help them navigate it safely and make the most of everything gaming has to offer! It's all about striking that perfect balance between independence and involvement.
